

ABORIGINAL HERITAGE ACT 2006

AREA BOUNDARIES IN RELATION TO REGISTERED ABORIGINAL PARTIES

MARTANG PTY LTD

(Registered 14/09/2007)

The boundary begins in Mortlake township at the junction of the Hamilton Highway (as Shaw Street) and the Mortlake-Ararat Road, and continues progressively:

- south-westerly then westerly along the Hamilton Highway (as Shaw and Dunlop Streets) through Mortlake township to the junction of that highway with the Hopkins Highway
- generally north-westerly then westerly along the Hamilton Highway, through Hexham and Caramut township to the junction between the Hamilton Highway and Peshurst-Dunkeld Road at Peshurst township
- northerly, north-easterly along the Peshurst Dunkeld Road to its junction with Glenelg Highway
- north-easterly along the Glenelg Highway to its junction (as Parker Street) with the Grampians Road (as Templeton Street) in Dunkeld township
- northerly and then north-westerly along the Grampians Road to its junction with Victoria Valley Road at the south-eastern boundary of the Grampians National Park at longitude 142.333535 latitude -37.629325
- north-easterly, then north-westerly along the eastern boundary of the Grampians National Park to a point on the eastern boundary of the Park, at longitude 142.674611 latitude -37.326918
- easterly in a straight line for about 250 metres from that point to the end of Mint Road at longitude 142.676819 latitude -37.327717
- easterly along that road for about 600 metres to its junction with the Moyston-Dunkeld Road
- generally north-easterly along that road for about 8 kilometres to its junction with the Moyston-Willaura Road and the Ararat-Pomonal Road at Moyston township
- generally easterly along the Ararat-Pomonal Road (becoming Barkly Street) to its junction with the Mortlake-Ararat Road (as Vincent Street) in Ararat township
- northerly along Vincent Street for about 280 metres to its junction with the Pyrenees highway (as Palmerston Street)
- easterly then north-easterly along that highway to its junction with the Ararat-St Arnaud Road
- northerly along that road to its junction with the Landsborough-Elmhurst Road to the immediate south-east of Landsborough township

- generally south-easterly along that road to the point where it crosses the Wimmera River
- generally south-easterly along that river for about 7 kilometres to the point where it is crossed by the Pyrenees Highway
- generally easterly along that highway for about 600 metres to its junction with the Beaufort-Elmhurst Road east of Elmhurst township
- generally southerly along that road to the point where it crosses Fiery Creek near Raglan township, at longitude 143.292512 latitude -37.299423
- generally south-westerly along Fiery Creek to the point on the eastern edge of Lake Bolac where it joins with a connector channel to Salt Creek, at longitude 142.880001 latitude -37.734212
- continuing generally south-westerly along that connector channel to the point on the southern edge of Lake Bolac where it joins with Salt Creek, at longitude 142.865407 latitude -37.747250
- generally south-westerly and southerly along Salt Creek to the point where it is crossed by the Mortlake-Ararat Road in Woorandoo township, at longitude 142.801122 latitude -37.891883
- southerly along the Mortlake-Ararat Road to its junction with the Hamilton Highway (as Shaw Street) in Mortlake township, to the point where the boundary began.

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EXPLANATORY NOTES FOR BOUNDARY DESCRIPTIONS

Reference Datum

Geographical coordinates are referenced to the Geocentric Datum of Australia 1994 (GDA94), in decimal degrees.

Reference Data and Source:

- Roads & Rivers Centrelines are based on topographic vector data (1:25,000) sourced from the Land Information Group, Land Victoria, Department of Sustainability and Environment, (VicMap Data), VIC (April 2006).

- Road reserve boundaries are determined from property data sourced from the Land Information Group, Land Victoria, Department of Sustainability and Environment, (VicMap Data), VIC (April 2006).

- Mean Low Water Mark is based on coastline data sourced from Geoscience Australia (1998).

Interpretation

- Where a boundary follows a linear feature such as a road or stream, the boundary is the centreline of that feature unless otherwise specified.
- Wherever possible, road names used in a boundary description are as shown in the VicRoads Country Street Directory of Victoria. Alternate road names or route numbers are included where necessary to improve the clarity of the description.
- Coordinates, expressed in degrees of latitude and longitude, are included for points where the location of a boundary might otherwise be uncertain (for example, the point at which a road crosses a meandering stream). In some cases, a boundary may also be described as a series of straight lines joining coordinate points.
